A Bit of This and That

It Doesn't Hurt, It is Not Difficult, and It Won't Cost You a Dime

As Bob Dylan would remind us all, "The times, they are a changin'." Last fall, the PS OLOC miniNEWS got a new look, and now we are about to change how it is distributed.

What we've been doing up until now is sending the miniNEWS issues out three ways. It's comes to you 1) via the PS OLOC Yahoo group, or 2) directly mailed to you at a personal email address, or 3) printed and - that's snail mailed to you. 1) was, and is, the ideal! 2) was our accommodation to those who didn't like have of Yahoo. And 3) was reserved for the handful of women who didn't have email.

It only takes a few minutes for us to post the miniNEWS to the Yahoo group, but it takes us much longer to email directly. That requires us to keep email addresses updated, and then to send out a series of group emails, spreading those postings out over a few hours. The groups for group emails must be kept relatively small (in numbers of addresses) and be sent out infrequently, or they will be considered spam and blocked by many mail programs.

We need everyone who enjoys receiving the PS OLOC miniNEWS to join the Yahoo group!

Starting in May, our goal is for the distribution to be almost exclusively via Yahoo. We really don't want to lose any of you as readers, so we're devoting space in this miniNEWS as well.

Joining the Yahoo group doesn't hurt, really. And it isn't hard. And it's free. You do not need a Yahoo email address to join the group. What you do need is a Yahoo account – that's simply establishing a user name and a password. Nothing else is required. You will even have options, like getting only special announcements, such as an issue of the miniNEWS.

If you aren't part of the PS OLOC Yahoo group already, and you do have a Yahoo ID, send an email to psoloc-subscribe@yahoogroups.com. That will let us know and we'll approve you, send you an email invite, you accept, and it's a done deal. If you aren't a part of the PS OLOC Yahoo group and you don't have a Yahoo ID, go to www. yahoo.com, set up an account, then email us as above.

We'll remind you in the next issue as well, but that'll be it. Come May, we're making our move: 98+% sent via Yahoo group email and less than 2% sent via snail mail.

Gathr Films... Is That a typo?

No. It really is Gathr. In the article above, to get tix to the film, you go to Gathr.us

So what's Gathr? There are so many worthy niche films that never get booked at a theater. Gathr works to set dates/times/places for showings of these films. Once the details are set, word goes out. IF enough people "buy" tickets, the showing happens. Reaching that threshold number of tix is called tipping. No one is charged for their tix until the film tips. If tix sales don't reach the minimum, the showing is canceled. It's an intriguing process, and they offer some amazing films. Not many show here, but you can actually work with them to try to get a showing where you want it. You can also click on a film that interests you and they'll notify you when a showing is listed in your area.

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Kathy P. not only suggested running a series of articles based on interviewing various people in the PS OLOC community, but she took on doing the interview and writing it up! Yea! Here is Kathy's first contribution in this series, helping us all get to know Marilyn Vogler.

At [al]most fifty
I am tired of whittling my voice to fit incongruous spaces
and impatient with softening the edges of what I say.
At [al]most fifty
I am [almost] ready to risk revolution I am well into my life
and my words are too many to write without passion.

Marilyn Vogler earned her Ph.D. in Rhetoric and Technical Communication in the Department of Humanities within a largely engineering institution, Michigan Technological University. (For many years after, Dr. Vogler worked as Assistant Dean of the graduate school. Later, she transferred into the International Programs office where she stayed until retirement.) Marilyn's dissertation is both introspective and telescopic into patriarchal academia as she explores the experience of women writing their dissertations.

Marilyn writes that "both the community and the language in which dissertations are generally written are gendered masculine. Negotiating a voice that is acceptable in a dissertation while maintaining fidelity to a sense of who one is seems more problematic as one's distance from the center of the dominant culture increases." She explores this within an academic community in which under-representation (particularly of women) remains a serious issue.

Dr. Vogler addressed her topic from parallel perspectives. She drew from others' experiences via conversations with fifteen women in, or beyond, the process; friends' anecdotes;

and published accounts. Simultaneously, she approached the topic autobiographically as she worked with her committee to find ways to alter the process yet still do a dissertation.

Paging through her "final product" makes clear the variety of voices possible within a dissertation: essay and poetry (an example of her own above, and others') as well as analytical components; varied visual qualities of text (a definite challenge to electronic formatting in 1998!), and experimentation with non-visual interpretations (such as comparison of sections of her work to a passacaglia or rondo).

Dr. Vogler points out that a woman "need not reconstitute herself through the (typical) academic language, form and process, in order to be initiated into the community of scholars." She encourages "flexibility if the academic community is to become diverse." Marilyn demonstrates this thesis powerfully in her ground-breaking dissertation, Becoming Most Fully Ourselves: Gender, Voice and Ritual in Dissertations.

P.S. I asked Marilyn, "Have you seen any hope since?" Her response: GROAN...NO.

January D. Allison Event Report

What a bonus: women attending the January event got to witness (via video) a presentation by Dorothy Allison that challenged most everyone's mind. And, for the same low, low price of \$0, they got to witness – and for some, participate in – a demonstration of one of the premises in Dorothy's speech: that we, as lesbians, seldom take "That won't work" as an answer.



Instead, we figure out how to make it work. Need to show the video but your equipment isn't up to the task? Try out-thinking it. Problem with the computer? Someone lent us her own. Problem with the sound? We've solved bigger challenges than that! No batteries? Wait a few minutes, I'll go get some!

National Women's History Month by Kathy P

March is National Women's History Month. Growing out of a small-town school event in California, Women's History Month is a celebration of women's contributions to history, culture and society. The U.S. has observed it annually throughout March since 1987.

2015 is the NWHP's (National Women's History Project) 35th Anniversary. In celebration of this anniversary, nine women were chosen as Honorees who have contributed in very special ways to the work of "writing women back into history."

In 2014, Arden Eversmeyer (of the OLOHP) was named as an NWHP honoree for her work in preserving herstories



of lesbians born in the first half of the 20th century. The 2015 NWHP theme, Weaving the Stories of Women's Lives, pays tribute to the significance of recognizing and sharing women's stories.

A celebratory idea: On the occasion of her 75th birthday in March of 2014, Diane Ste. Marie "called upon" invited guests to concelebrate with her at her gathering at University

Friends Meeting House in Seattle. In advance, she requested that seven friends and family members represent seven significant persons, living or deceased, whom she wished to honor. Among those were Champlain, Donald Duck (Diane's grandkids and friends were there) and others. Her final "guest" was Arden Eversmeyer (just honored by NWMP as founder of the Old Lesbian Oral Herstory Project) and "acted" by Kathy P). During the event, family and friends got to peruse Diane's own finished product: her OLOHP herstory from interview to transcription to bound-withdocumentation book.

The Three R's Column by Ellen K...Not!

One of the best ways to recycle is to find someone who can use what you no longer need. If it's available in your area, try Freecycle.org. It is an organized online way for you to post items you'd like to see go to a new home or to watch for something you need.

There is a Freecycle group in Tacoma that serves it and the surrounding area, as well as groups in Olympia and Seattle. Navigate to Freecycle.org and enter the city you'd like to search. If a group exists, click on its link and you'll be able to read postings. To go any further, you'll need to join their Yahoo group.

How it works once you've joined, is that you set how you want the Yahoo group to work. Do you want an email each time someone posts? Not likely, but maybe a daily digest. Or would you

rather go look at listings when you are interested? In that case, set your account to "no emails" and go check the site when you have something to post. When you post, other members can opt to say "I want that" or ask a question. They don't know where you live or even your email address. Freecycle forwards their message to you and it's up to you whether to reply or not. You may get 10 emails from people wanting your item – or none; who gets it is up to you. They come pick it up once you've provided them with your info. You'll get the hang of it quickly.

We've moved on stacks of old magazines (to a school teacher), a storm door we replaced, old nursery pots, an outdated computer printer, 4 chairs, a 35mm camera, a washing machine, empty moving boxes, and lots, lots more.

International Women's Day 2015 by Kathy P

Around the world, International Women's Day represents an opportunity to celebrate the achievements of women while calling for greater equality. *Make It Happen* is the 2015 theme, encouraging effective action



for advancing and recognizing women.

On March 8, 1857, garment workers in New York City marched and picketed, demanding improved working conditions, a ten hour day, and equal rights for women. Their ranks were broken up by the police. Fifty-one years later, March 8, 1908, their sisters in the needle trades in New York marched again, honoring the 1857 march, demanding the vote, and an end to sweat-shops and child labor. The first International Women's Day was held in 1911. Each year International Women's Day (IWD) is celebrated on March 8.

IWD is now an official holiday in Afghanistan, Armenia, Azerbaijan, Belarus, Burkina Faso, Cambodia, China (for women only), Cuba, Georgia, Guinea-Bissau, Eritrea, Kazakhstan, Kyrgyzstan, Laos, Madagascar (for women only), Moldova, Mongolia, Montenegro, Nepal (for women only), Russia, Tajikistan, Turkmenistan, Uganda, Ukraine, Uzbekistan, Vietnam and Zambia.

In 2015, International Women's Day highlights the

Beijing Declaration and Platform for Action, a historic road map signed by 189 governments in 1995 that sets the agenda for realizing women's rights. To this end, the theme of this year's International Women's Day is the clarion call of UN Women's Beijing+20 campaign, Empowering Women, Empowering Humanity: Picture It! We celebrate the many achievements that have come since then and galvanize action to address the gaps that still remain in making gender equality a reality. The Beijing Platform for Action focuses on 12 critical areas of concern, and envisions a world where each woman and girl can exercise her choices, such as participating in politics, getting an education, having an income, and living in societies free from violence and discrimination.

"What is a Virtual Village?" by Anne H.

We're hearing the term Virtual Village more and more often, so we asked Anne, "what does that mean?" She shared this great description done by the Village to Village Network.

- They are a grassroots effort to address the current and unfolding challenges of an older America.
- The VV concept arose out of community members' desire to reside in their own homes while being able to access services that address their changing lifestyles as they aged.
- At its core, the Village Movement is consumer- and customer-driven.
- It connects members to vetted, discounted providers and volunteers for any service they might want or need.
- It offers members healthy living: exercise classes, yoga, tai chi, informal lunches, and discounted home care providers.
- It organizes stimulating programs, seminars, and trips with the VV community to support connectedness and friendships.

There are no villages that are exactly the same. Each determines its needs and services. Users also pay a varying amount to the village to receive the services. Fees are used to provide administrative services and build the infrastructure of the village.

Aging lesbians may fear losing their independence and feeling less able to protect and advocate for themselves. They might fear retribution if they are out, appear to offend or seem too demanding of those who support them. As a result, they often go back in the closet if they don't have a strong support system.

PS OLOC could create its own lesbian VVs. Villages would be defined geographically and be structured to use PS OLOC member volunteers to help lesbians in need who reside within the geographical area of the village.

VV services could be tailored to the unique needs of older lesbians. Members involved in these virtual villages might need assistance or be volunteers who provide services or perhaps both. Providers include LGBTQ allies as well as lesbian volunteers. Vendors would be LGBTQ friendly businesses. Lesbians receiving services would enjoy a strong, supportive relationship with PS OLOC members and its activities. A win for everyone! Interested? Let Anne Henry know at juliainaanne@gmail.com



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Geek Corner: What is a QR-Code and Why Care?

QR (Quick Response) codes are an alternative to barcodes that we see on many items that we buy. One advantage to a QR code is that it can store more info in it than a barcode. But the biggest advantage is that almost every smart phone can read a QR code – no separate scanner needed. When might you use one? When you pull into the cell phone lot at the airport to wait for someone, you can aim your phone at one of the signs in the lot and it automatically connects



you to a website where you can find out if the plane you are waiting for is on time! QR codes are being added to products, theater tix, business cards, advertisements in magazines, and much more.
