At its December 2015 retreat the QC3 members identified six areas in which they felt PS-OLOC leadership could use some help: fundraising, grant writing, social media/communications, coordination of special projects and interest groups, legal advice, and miniNEWS.

We certainly recognize that you may know of others you feel aren't being covered and should be. We invite any and all who wish to volunteer to work with the Queer Crones Coordinating Council on needs identified by us, or by you, to let one of us know (we are listed at the end of the miniNEWS). Then maybe you could talk it over with us at

one of our QC3 meetings, and together we'll decide where things should go from there.

Some of you might like to go further and join the QC3. We meet every other month, usually the first Tuesday of the month, and do one retreat, usually in the fall. Each

member commits to working in several areas, abiding by operating principles (see a later article on these) and approval by consensus. We would invite you to a couple of meetings to determine if you find our group as a fit, and vice versa, and how our expectations of each other jibe. While we would like to keep the QC3 on the relatively small side for optimal workability, no number is cast in stone, and new blood is always healthy.

### Who is Welcome in PS OLOC?



- 1. We will assume the best intentions in one another.
- 2. We will not get pissed at anyone for failing to fulfill expectations we never clearly set.
- 3. We will give feedback honestly and directly and not be passive-aggressive.
- 4. We will focus on specific behaviors, not attack personal character.
- 5. We will give everyone chances to learn and to improve.
- 6. We will not get pissed at anyone if we've never given them feedback and a chance to improve.
- 7. We will not form cliques nor spread gossip.
- 8. We will own our part in any conflict.
- 9. We will own our part in creating and implementing solutions.
- 10. We will not take our jobs for granted.

Not to leave well enough alone, the QC3 added one more.

11. We agree to revisit this list as often as needed!

We may feel relatively comfortable here in Washington state, but have you thought about what might happen if you and your partner had an accident, or worse, while traveling in the US? Or abroad? Here are just two examples of areas that still need our attention and our activism.

# Married on Sunday, Fired on Monday

Houston's recent setback in protecting our basic rights was horrible, but that is only one city. Twenty-eight states still lack basic civil rights and protections for LGBT people in the workplace, adoption, housing, and more. They may have to let us marry, but that doesn't mean they have to protect our rights. As unbelievable as it seems, in Arkansas, SB 202 was signed by the governor earlier this year. The new law is basically an anti-anti-discrimination bill that actually prevent cities and counties from protecting the civil rights of gay people! Unless things have changed recently, none of the following states has a state-wide nondiscrimination law in place.

# Marriage & Native Lands

Here in Washington, we live alongside dozens of tribal lands. You probably already knew that Native American reservations are not bound by the same laws as non-native lands in the US – that includes the right to marry. Some Washington tribes have extended marriage rights to same-sex partners, notably the Puyallup, Suguamish and Colville tribes. But others here, and nationwide, have not, with the two largest tribes, the Navaho and Cherokee, banning marriage.

It will be fascinating to listen over the next few years to see how groups work within their tribes to effect change. It may be a whole different fight than it was in the non-native cultures.

If you do much shopping on the internet, especially on sites like Amazon.com, you may have run into an item priced at 1¢ and wondered how that can be true.


